ENGLISH-SPEAKING BIG BOOK STUDY GROUP (Gothenburg)

Address: St. Andrews Church, Hvitfeldtsplatsen 2, Gothenburg.

Directions: Grönsakstorget is the nearest tramstop to St. Andrew's. From the Cent Station you can take trams 1, 9 or 11 walk up Södra Larmgatan, then turn left into Hvitfeldtsplatsen and the church is on your left. Trams 6, 9 and 11 stop at the Hagakyrkan stop, and from Hagakyrkan, walk north over Rosenlundsbro, keep straight on, and the church is 200m on your right.

INTERNATIONAL GROUP (Stockholm)

Address: Karlbergsvägen 32b, Stockholm.

Directions: From subway stop Odenplan, come up the Västmannagatan exit and that will put you out on the street facing in the correct direction. The location is the second door on the right, on the beginning of the next block, and has a small plaque that reads "BILL O BOB VÄNNER" (Friends of Bill and Bob).

SWENGLISH GROUP (Stockholm)

Address: Nobba Brass & Nubbe locale, Björngårdsgatan 1b, Stockholm.

Directions: From subway stop Mariatorget, come up the Mariatorget side. Exit the station and turn left walking one block to the square (Mariatorget). Turn right on S:t Paulsgatan and walk one block. Turn right on Björngårdsgatan, the locale is half a block down on the left side, sharing an entrance with Nobel Travel Agency. Address: St. Andrews Church, Hvitfeldtsplatsen 2, Gothenburg.

Directions: Grönsakstorget is the nearest tramstop to St. Andrew's. From the Central Station you can take trams 1, 9 or 11 walk up Södra Larmgatan, then turn left into Hvitfeldtsplatsen and the church is on your left. Trams 6, 9 and 11 stop at the Hagakyrkan stop, and from Hagakyrkan, walk north over Rosenlundsbro, keep straight on, and the church is 200m on your right.
